## Limeledge Botanical Garden and Arboretum

## Welcome to Limeledge!

Located on a historic farmstead in Elbridge, New York, Limeledge is a public botanical garden and ecological restoration site in its early stages of development. We are excited to share our progress with you as we work to create a one-of-a-kind destination for conservation, education, and native plant stewardship.

## What to Expect When You Visit

## Limeledge is a Rough, Rustic Property

Visitors should expect a mix of scenic landscapes, early-phase plantings, and ongoing restoration. Much of the property remains in its natural or semi-natural state, including unmowed fields, rocky terrain, and areas with historic debris. Limeledge is not the type of botanical garden that is intended to look like a golf course.

- Our plant collections are in their infancy. Many woody plants are small saplings housed in steel cages, marked with stakes and flags.
- With the exception of the Brookside entrance area, most of the grassy areas are **unmowed or only mowed twice a year** to preserve wildlife habitat, including the Cook Lot.
- The **Cook Lot**, our main arboretum "tree lawn," features tall grasses and selectively mowed paths.

## Our Ethos: Open, Wild, and Welcoming

At Limeledge, we believe that access to nature, beauty, and education should never come with a price tag. That's why visiting the gardens and trails is always free of charge. Whether you're here to learn, reflect, explore, or just breathe a little deeper, we welcome you—no ticket required.

## **Important Visitor Guidelines**

## 1. Hours of Operation

- Open daily from dawn to dusk, May 1 through October 31.
- Closed during the off-season for maintenance and safety.

## 2. Motor Vehicles are Limited to Parking Areas

- Please do not go past the parking areas (see map). This will make for a safer environment for our visitors while also protecting the structural integrity of our trails.
- 3. No Bicycles or E-Bikes, Please



 To ensure a safe and peaceful experience for all visitors—and to protect sensitive trails and plantings—bicycles and e-bikes are not permitted on Limeledge grounds. We appreciate your understanding as we work to make Limeledge a welcoming space for walkers, families, and nature lovers of all ages.

#### 4. Stay on Trails

- Please remain on marked trails and paths at all times.
- Terrain and the trails themselves can be **uneven**, **rocky**, **or overgrown** in places. Sometimes all three!
- Many woodland areas contain **sensitive understory plants** that are easily damaged by foot traffic.

#### 5. Pets

- Pets are welcome, but must be **leashed at all times** in accordance with New York State leash laws.
- Leashes should not exceed 6 feet in length.
- **Pet waste must be removed** and properly disposed of. Please be respectful of other visitors and the environment.

#### 5. Farmland and Crops

- Over **100 acres remain in agricultural use**. Limeledge is still a working farm.
- **Do not enter crop fields**, even if they appear unoccupied.
- Do not damage, disturb, or interfere with crops, machinery, or farm equipment.

## 6. Quarry Area

- The historic **farm quarry** is a key feature of Limeledge. It will soon host rare and unusual plants.
- Please enjoy this area using **designated paths only**.
- **Do not climb** on rock piles, overburden debris, or the quarry sidewall. These areas may be unstable and are being restored.

#### 7. Caution and Construction Areas

- Barns and structures on site are **currently closed to the public** pending renovation.
- Areas marked with **caution tape or signage** are off-limits for safety reasons. **Do not remove, cross, or tamper** with marked barriers.

#### 8. GNP Production Zones

- Some areas are used by **Go Native! Perennials (GNP)** for propagation and seed production.
- These zones are **restricted to staff and partners**. Please respect all signage and fencing in these areas.

#### 9. Natural Hazards

• **Poison-ivy (***Toxicodendron radicans***) is abundant** throughout the property. Stay on trails and be mindful of vegetation. Note that staghorn sumac (*Rhus typhina*) is also



common but is completely **non-toxic** and harmless except to rare individuals that may have a specific allergy to that species.

• **Old machinery, tires, and debris** are still present in limited areas. Do not touch or approach them—removal is ongoing.

#### **10. Stewardship and Conduct**

- Leave no trace. Pack out all trash, belongings, and pet waste.
- **Do not pick or collect** any plants, seeds, or rocks. Limeledge is willing to use our plants to propagate and share whenever possible, but make sure you ask!
- **Respect wildlife** and avoid disturbing nests, burrows, or animals.
- Smoking, vaping, alcohol, and controlled substances are prohibited.
- Motorized vehicles, drones, and amplified sound devices are **not permitted** without prior approval.
- Children must be **supervised at all times**.

## Additional Notes

#### **Ticks and Insects**

- Please check yourself and pets for **ticks** after walking through grassy or wooded areas. The high grass in many areas at Limeledge are ideal tick habitat, especially with the large population of white-tailed deer.
- Insect repellent and appropriate clothing are encouraged.

## **Group Visits & Photography**

- Large group visits, educational programs, weddings, and photography sessions must be **scheduled in advance**.
- Commercial or professional photography requires **prior permission**.
